Seeing is believing: Interpreting
Praat's visual data in our classroom

Praat (Boersma & Weenink, 2021) is an open-source acoustic analysis software, intended for phoneticians who study spoken language. In this workshop, I aim to show, through practical activities, some ways of using this software in our classroom to visualise vowel and consonant features, stress and intonation. We will also use Praat's visual information to better understand the physicality of pronunciation.

Viktor has conducted research in linguistics, particularly variationist sociophonetics and second language acquisition. Pronunciation and its teaching are his passions, and he is especially interested in teaching priorities in a diverse, inclusive and 'glocalised' classroom, as well as language variation and change.

Sometimes, despite our best laid plans and materials, issues appear in our students' pronunciation which are not addressed by prescribed syllabi or coursebooks. How can we fill this pronunciation gap and meet our students' ongoing needs? In this workshop, I will discuss some ways in which we can create our own bespoke pronunciation resources using technology, enabling tutors to target, recycle, review, and personalise their pronunciation practice.

Gemma has a CELTA, Dip TESOL and a Master's of Research in English Language and Linguistics and has taught English in the UK, Ireland, Italy and the Middle East. Her main research interests lie in the use of regional L1 and global L2 Englishes in the pronunciation classroom.

Finally, I will present different ways in which podcasts can be used to help learners work on pronunciation.

Jonás's research interests include computer-assisted pronunciation training, second language speech learning, second language acquisition, and English phonetics and phonology. Most of his research to date has dealt with the different ways in which technology can facilitate pronunciation training.
